3. Roulette

Comparable to conventional casino roulette, but generally adapted with 3 results (red, black, and green/multiplier) represented by CS2 skin colors or team logo designs.

4. Coinflip

A simple 1v1 video game where 2 gamers wager skins or credits of roughly equivalent value. The system flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a small site commission, understood as the "rake").

5. Prize

Multiple gamers deposit skins into a main swimming pool. A [Skin Lords](#) virtual timer counts down, and a winner is picked through a lottery system. The higher the value of the skins a gamer deposits, the greater their analytical opportunity of winning the whole pot.

Safety, Risks, and Security Measures

Due to the fact that CS2 gambling sites operate beyond Valve's direct control, users need to exercise extreme caution. Engaging with these platforms carries several notable dangers:

- **Scams and Phishing:** Fake sites frequently mimic popular gambling platforms to steal Steam login qualifications or high-tier inventory products.
- **Lack of Consumer Protection:** Since lots of sites operate in legal grey locations, users who encounter technical problems, locked funds, or unreasonable bans have little option through standard legal channels.
