A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a small website commission). Low-to-Moderate (50/50 odds minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Several gamers deposit skins into a common swimming pool. Each skin contributes to the player's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the entire pot. High (Depends on the percentage of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Imitates the official Valve case openings, often with greater or personalized odds and distinct reward pools. High (Typically undesirable return to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Betting skins or money on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based upon live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate risk)

- **Dependency Potential:** The gamified nature of skin wagering-- integrated with the abstract sensation of using digital products instead of physical money-- can make it easier to develop compulsive gambling practices.
