

Hampton Bays does not announce itself with the polished certainty of a place trying to impress you. It earns attention more slowly, the way a harbor changes your breathing when you round the bend and see the water open up. The town sits at the meeting point of land, marsh, bay, and ocean, and that geography has shaped everything about it, from its earliest settlement patterns to the way people still use it today. There are summers here that feel busy enough to rattle the streets, and there are off-season mornings when the salt air, the cedar shingles, and the low winter light make the whole place seem almost private.
