2. **Get rid of a Screw:** Remove the middle screw from the leading hinge leaf that goes into the door frame.
3. **Change with a Longer Screw:** Insert a 3-inch wood screw in place of the short initial screw. Guarantee it drives deep into the wall stud instead of just the door frame.
4. **Evaluate the Door:** Tighten the screw and close the door. The longer screw will pull the hinge-- and the entire door-- tighter to the frame, raising the sagging corner off the floor.
5. **Repeat if Necessary:** If the door still sags, repeat the process on the middle hinge.
