Coinflip	A simple 1v1 PvP video game where 2 gamers wager skins of approximately equal worth. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the whole pot. 50/50 odds, minus a little platform commission (rake).	
Jackpot	Several players contribute skins to a central pot. Each skin's value figures out the gamer's "ticket" share. A spinner selects one winner who takes whatever. Based upon the overall value contributed; platform takes a portion charge.
