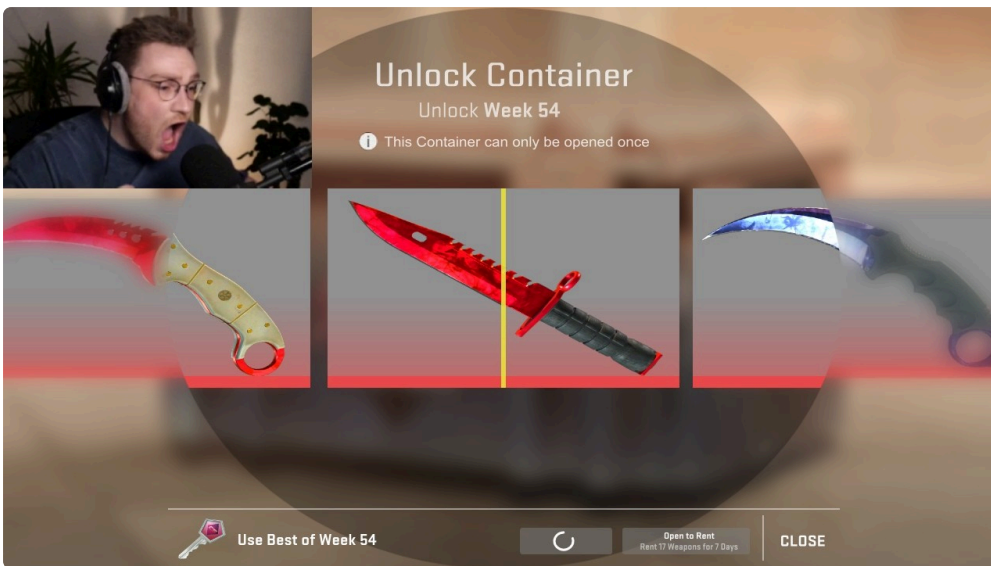


Rare CS: GO Cases: A Comprehensive Guide for Collectors and Investors

- **Revolver Case**-- Released to accompany the Revolver Case weapon set. Its exclusivity originates from the brief window throughout which it could be earned.
- **Gods and Monsters Case**-- A community-created case that was only available for a brief period in 2015.
- **Chroma 2 Case**-- Though still technically accessible, its initial drop rate was lower than most, and it is thought about "unusual" by numerous traders.

3. **In-Game Drops**-- For cases that still periodically drop (e.g., Chroma 2), players can increase their chances by participating in official Valve operations or by playing on active servers. The drop rate remains low, so persistence is necessary.
