

Farmingville does not try to impress you all at once. That is part of its appeal. It is the kind of place where the interesting details reveal themselves slowly, in a cemetery tucked behind a road you almost missed, a church steeple catching late afternoon light, a seasonal event that turns a familiar parking lot into a real neighborhood gathering, or a driveway that looks noticeably better because someone cared enough to clean and seal the pavers before the warm weather set in.
