When purchased from the main shop, these items have a one-week trade cooldown. After that week, players are complimentary to:

1. Keep and use them in-game.
2. Sell them on the Steam Community Market for Steam Wallet funds.
3. Trade them straight with other players via Steam trades.
4. Gamble or offer them on third-party marketplace websites (though players should constantly exercise care with external websites).

Popular Skin Themes

Throughout the years, certain skin collections have dominated the neighborhood's preferences. Gamers frequently buy matching sets to provide their base and gear a merged appearance. A few of the most popular themes include:

- **Glowing (Glow-in-the-Dark):** Highly demanded because they allow players to see their weapons and hotbars in dark environments or during the Rust night cycle.
- **Camouflage (Cammo):** Designed to assist gamers mix into particular biomes (snow, desert, or forest).
- **Sci-Fi/ Futuristic:** Sleek metallic surfaces with neon accents.
- **Distressed/ Post-Apocalyptic:** Items that look rusty, blood-stained, or duct-taped together, fitting the game's gritty aesthetic.

How to Acquire Rust Skins
