1. Small and Nano Tanks (1 to 14 Gallons)

- **10 Gallons:** The holy grail for novices. A 10-gallon tank is cost effective, commonly available in sets, and forgiving enough for a newbie. It can house a betta with a few tank mates (like snails or nano shrimp), a school of small education fish (like chili rasboras), or a nest of cherry shrimp.

2. Medium Tanks (20 to 55 Gallons)

- **20 Gallon (High vs. Long):** A 20-gallon long is a preferred amongst aquascapers and fish keepers alike. It can conveniently house little neighborhood fish like tetras, corydoras, and livebearers (guppies, platies).

- **40 Gallon Breeder:** Often called the "breeder" tank, this is commonly concerned by enthusiasts as one of the best percentages in the aquarium hobby. It has a big bottom footprint relative to its height, making it perfect for bottom-dwelling fish, reptiles, or largely planted aquascapes.
- **55 Gallon:** The traditional rectangle-shaped tank. A 55-gallon offers keepers the ability to blend numerous species, develop striking mid-sized community tanks, or keep moderately sized cichlids. However, note that a 55-gallon is relatively narrow front-to-back, which can limit aquascaping depth.

3. Large and Giant Tanks (75 Gallons and Up)

- **75 Gallon:** Similar in length to a 55-gallon, but significantly much deeper (front-to-back). This additional depth permits much more creative rockwork and driftwood layouts. It can house larger cichlids, a considerable school of medium-sized fish, or a thriving beginner saltwater setup.
- **90 and 125 Gallon:** These majestic tanks offer huge swimming passages. A 125-gallon (normally 6 feet long) is the entry point for genuinely large freshwater types like Oscars, big plecos, or a diverse African cichlid community.
- **150+ Gallons:** Custom area. These tanks are heavy, need specialized cabinetry, structural floor support, and robust purification systems. They are usually booked for advanced freshwater setups (like discus screen tanks) or marine reef environments.

Factors to Consider Before Buying

- **Available Space and Maintenance Access:** Consider the physical dimensions. Will the tank fit through doorways during a relocation? Exists adequate clearance above the tank to perform water changes, gravel vacuuming, and filter upkeep?
- **Budget:** Larger tanks need larger heating units, more effective filters, more substrate, and more ornamental components. Continuous expenses (electricity, water conditioner, fish food) also scale up with tank size.
