Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not exist in particular conditions (e.g., a skin might just spawn up to Minimal Wear).

2. StatTrak™ Technology

Skins with the StatTrak™ prefix feature a little, radiant LED counter connected to the weapon body. This counter tracks the precise variety of kills the owner has secured with that particular weapon. As soon as geared up by

another player, it momentarily shows an "error" until gone back to the owner. StatTrak skins normally command a greater rate on the marketplace.

3. Souvenir Packages

During Valve-sponsored Major tournaments, audiences seeing by means of Steam or partnered streaming platforms can drop Souvenir Packages. Defense inside these bundles feature gold sticker labels commemorating the match, the groups, and the MVP of the round, making them extremely collectible.

Rarity Tiers and Drop Rates

Skins are classified into distinct rarity tiers, which dictate how often they appear in weapon cases. The rarity color codes are widely acknowledged in the gaming neighborhood:

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, standard weapon surfaces.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly superior to customer grade.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard low-tier products found in cases.
- **Limited (Purple):** Mid-tier products; frequently used in trade-ups.
- **Classified (Pink):** Highly desired, striking designs.
- **Covert (Red):** The greatest basic weapon tier; incredibly uncommon.
- **Rare Special Item (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. The holy grail of unboxing.
