Beyond these standard tiers, items can also bear the **StatTrak**™ innovation, which digitally tracks the number of verified eliminates a gamer makes with that particular weapon, usually driving the price up considerably.

### The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most remarkable elements of CS: GO skins is that no two similar weapons look precisely the exact same. Every weapon is assigned a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or exterior wear.

The wear value is completely locked to the item when it is produced and does not deteriorate even more through use.

### The Five Exterior Conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Beautiful, perfect finish with very little to no scratches.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor blemishes or minor scuffs, normally just noticeable upon close inspection.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Noticeable wear and scratches, stabilizing cost and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Considerable paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily deteriorated, often looking rusted, weathered, or nearly entirely removed of paint.

*Note: Certain skins-- such as the popular AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their most affordable possible wear states incredibly rare and valuable.*

## How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital properties runs similarly to a real-world stock exchange. Costs are dictated simply by supply and demand, affected by numerous crucial aspects:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports professional starts utilizing a specific skin during a significant competition, the demand for that item usually spikes over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- dwindles, causing rates to rise organically with time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning products out of blood circulation and permanently changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present brand-new thematic collections, briefly flooding or shifting the focus of the marketplace.

## Popular Weapon Families to Collect

For players aiming to start a collection, certain weapon households have actually attained famous status within the neighborhood due to their creative style and eminence.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its sci-fi, white, black, and bright orange geometric aesthetic. Available on the M4A4, AWP, P90, and P250.
- **The Case Hardened Series:** Famous for its mottled blue and gold pattern-index system. Particular rare "Blue Gem" patterns-- where the blade of a knife is almost completely covered in lively blue-- have offered for tens of thousands of dollars.
