Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching.	
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Exceptionally used, often changing the graphic entirely. <i>(Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in BS, called "Blackscars").</i>	

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and function gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how often they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.

3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
