StatTrak™ Items

Any weapon unboxed has a roughly **10% opportunity** of being a StatTrak™ variant. These items include a small LED screen embedded on the weapon that tracks the variety of validated kills made by the player utilizing that specific gun. Generally, StatTrak™ weapons command a higher rate on the marketplace, though exceptions exist for specific high-tier collector knives.
