- **Pattern Index:** Many skins include procedural generation, implying the texture is mapped in a different way depending upon a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples consist of the *Case Hardened* series, where specific seed numbers produce large quantities of blue on the weapon surface area ("Blue Gems"), driving costs up greatly.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins
