

Bayshore in Miami Beach has a way of revealing itself slowly. It is not the part of town that announces itself with one headline attraction or a neon-lit postcard moment. Instead, it works on you in layers. You notice the quiet streets first, then the palms, then the mix of old Miami elegance and everyday neighborhood life, and only after that do you realize how much history and character sit beneath the surface.
