4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once acquired, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which players can purchase, offer, or trade them freely on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike many video games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account forever, Rust skins possess real-world liquidity via the Steam Wallet (and third-party markets, though care is encouraged). Prices fluctuate based upon supply, need, and total gamer count.

Certain rare skins have accomplished famous status, commanding hundreds or even countless dollars. The economy is driven by deficiency; once a weekly store rotation ends, Facepunch seldom re-releases those specific items, suggesting the total supply is forever capped.
